From January 1<sup>st</sup> - April 30<sup>th</sup>, 2016 there have been **656** traffic deaths





The Colorado Department of Public Safety announced the release of "Marijuana Legalization in Colorado: Early Findings," its first official report evaluating the impact of the state's historic legalization of marijuana on public safety, public health, and Colorado's kids.



The report draws from local, state, federal, and private data sets to examine post-legalization trends in marijuana consumption, marijuana-related arrests, marijuana-related emergency room admissions, and marijuana-impaired driving, among others. Importantly, its findings should be interpreted with caution: The lack of historical, pre-commercialization data on marijuana, the decreasing social stigma surrounding marijuana use, and enforcement challenges inherent to the implementation of Colorado's new and complex marijuana laws combine to make it difficult to translate these early findings into definitive outcomes.

"This report is a two-year snapshot of the impact of marijuana legalization on Colorado's kids, families, and communities," said Stan Hilkey, executive director of the Colorado Department of Public Safety. "While we still can't draw any long-term conclusions, today Colorado continues to make history by establishing an objective, data-backed baseline against which all future assessments of marijuana legalization, both in Colorado and around the world, will be weighed."



### Key findings include:

- . Among those 18-25 years old, marijuana usage has increased from 21 percent in 2006 to 31 percent in 2014.
- . Among those 26 or older, marijuana usage has increased from 5 percent in 2006 to 12 percent in 2014.
- . 33% of marijuana users who have reported marijuana use in the past 30 days have used daily.
- . Marijuana-related arrests have decreased by 46 percent between 2012 and 2014, while possession arrests were cut in half and sales arrests have decreased by 24 percent.



- . The trend for high school students ever using marijuana has declined from 42.4 percent in 2005 to 36.9 percent in 2013. The percentage of high school students currently using marijuana has decreased from 22.7 percent to 19.7 percent over the same period. Youth use in Colorado remains above the national average.
- . Marijuana-related hospitalizations have increased from a rate of 803 per 100,000 pre-commercialization to 2,413 per 100,000 post-commercialization.





- The period of retail commercialization showed a significant increase in emergency department visits, from 739 per 100,000 (2010-2013) to 956 per 100,000 emergency department visits (2014-June 2015).
- The prevalence of marijuana as the impairing substance among DUIs has increased from 12% in 2014 to 15% in 2014, although the total number of marijuana-related DUIDs decreased slightly.






In the 2014-15 school year, school-based discipline for drugs accounted for 41% of all expulsions, 31% of all law enforcement referrals, and 6% of all suspensions in Colorado.


### Ride Sober or Get Pulled Over



### Florida 2016 Click It or Ticket Border to Border Focused Plan

Date: May 23, 2016 (6PM -9 PM)

### **Border to Border Purpose and Overview:**

The 2016 Border to Border Operation, is a focused one-day effort of night-time enforcement kicking off the National Click it Or Ticket wave, encompassing fourteen (14) states along the eastern United States. Law enforcement will focus on the High Visibility Enforcement and statistical data results from this mini-campaign. DARS data shows larger numbers of drivers and passengers unrestrained at night than during the daytime.



### Florida 2016 Click It or Ticket Border to Border Focused Plan

### Strategy

The operation will include state, county and city/municipal law enforcement agencies. By demonstrating law enforcement solidarity and increased presence at border sites, we hope to send a 'zero tolerance' message to the public. Because the goal of the operation is to target the enforcement for this one-day campaign, between the hours of 6PM-9PM, law enforcement will utilize saturation patrols, high visibility enforcement techniques, checkpoints, target enforcement zones. Each location will be determined by the law enforcement agencies as will the additional usage of promotion of the event through social media outlets.



## Florida 2016 Click It or Ticket Border to Border Focused Plan

### Strategy

To encourage and promote the Border 2 Border one day event, each of the seven (7) law enforcement liaisons will award one of three incentive items, randomly chosen from the reporting agencies. To be eligible for the drawing, each agency must report using the online reporting site by midnight of May 30th.



#### **BUCKLE UP!**



F.S.S 316.614 Safety belt usage.—

- (4) It is unlawful for any person:
- (a) To operate a motor vehicle in this state unless each passenger and the operator of the vehicle under the age of 18 years are restrained by a safety belt or by a child restraint device pursuant to s. 316.613, if applicable; or
- (b) To operate a motor vehicle in this state unless the person is restrained by a safety belt.
- (5) It is unlawful for any person 18 years of age or older to be a passenger in the front seat of a motor vehicle unless such person is restrained by a safety belt when the vehicle is in motion.

If every person was properly restrained on every trip, thousands of additional lives could be saved by seat belts each year. Help occupants understand why seat belt use is required by law.

 Nearly half of the 21,022 passenger vehicle occupants who were killed on our nation's roadways in 2014 were not wearing their seat belts at the time of the fatal crashes, according to NHTSA.



- The statistics are worse among teens and young adults: Of passenger vehicle occupants 13 to 15 and 18 to 34 years old who were killed in crashes, 59 percent and 57 percent, respectively, were not buckled upthe highest percentages of all age groups. Within 🕆 the 18-34 age group, males who were killed in crashes were unrestrained 59 percent of the time.
- It's just as important to buckle up in the back seat. Too many people wrongly believe they are safe in



the back seat unrestrained. Fortyseven percent of all front-seat passenger vehicle occupants killed in crashes in 2014 were unrestrained, but 58 percent of those killed in back seats were unrestrained.\*

-Enforcement during the day AND at night — More, unrestrained crash fatalities happen at night (6 p.m. to 5:59 a.m.) compared to daytime crashes. In 2014, of those killed in nighttime crashes, 57 percent were not wearing seat belts (compared to 41% of occupants killed during daytime hours, 6 a.m. to 5:59 p.m.).


#### Crash Clock (national)

### 2012 – 2015 Total Fatality Counts\*


